

In Review: Statute 16 P.S.C.A. § 1219-B: Autopsy, Inquests and Reports

In Review:

In this edition, we're going to take a review Statute §1219-B: Autopsy, Inquests and Records, it states:

(a) Autopsy.--If, after investigation, the coroner is unable to determine the cause and manner of death, the coroner shall perform or order an autopsy on the body.

(b) Inquest.--If the coroner is unable to determine the cause and manner of death following an autopsy, the coroner may conduct an inquest upon a view of the body as provided by law. At the inquest, the coroner's duty shall be to:

(1) Ascertain the cause of death.

(2) Determine whether an individual other than the deceased was criminally responsible by act or neglect and the identity of the individual who may be responsible.

(3) Examine further evidence and witnesses regarding the cause of death.

(c) Recording.--The proceedings at the inquest shall be recorded, at the expense of the county, in a manner to be provided by the county commissioners.

(d) Retention and disposal.—

(1) The coroner may retain a deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA) specimen for diagnostic, evidentiary or confirmatory purposes.

(2) Retained tissue, organs, blood, other bodily fluid, gas or another specimen from an autopsy are medical waste and shall be disposed of in accordance with applicable Federal and State laws.

(e) Liability.--A coroner who, in good faith, orders or performs a medical examination or autopsy under statutory authority shall be immune from civil liability for damages for ordering or performing the examination or autopsy.

Let's take a look at each of the points. The law clearly states that if the Coroner cannot determine the cause and manner of death, even after the investigation and view of the body, he/she **SHALL** perform or order an autopsy. There's that command word again. In reviewing this part, regardless of the type of death you are investigating, if a cause and/or manner cannot be determined an autopsy must be performed regardless of costs or budgetary issues. I know everyone tries to be fiscally prudent and budgetary sound, but there will be times where the cost of an autopsy cannot be avoided and the autopsy **shall** be performed. I know firsthand about dealing with Commissioners and financial issues, but at the end of the day, the bills are paid! Please remember never lessen the integrity of an investigation over a dollar!

Now, let's talk about section b, Inquests. According to this part of the Statute, the law states, if you are unable to determine a cause and manner of death, even after an autopsy was performed and the investigation has been completed, you may conduct or convene an inquest. This is completely up to your prerogative in convening one or not. (There is a complete statute for inquests, 16 P.S.C.A. § 1228-B: Inquest and Jury). One thing I was always concerned with in conducting an inquest, you can prevent the public attending the proceeding however, you have to let the media attend. Remember, you are having an issue with the investigation in determining the cause and manner of death, so everything you are discussing and witnesses are testifying to becomes public knowledge almost immediately. One way to circumvent this, was working with my District Attorney, we presented several cases before the sitting Grand Jury, which as you know, is

confidential. And based on their questions and recommendations, I was able to render a Cause and Manner of Death.

Again, this is your choice and your authority to convene an inquest. So, if you do decide to conduct an inquest, part of the jury's responsibilities is:

- 1. Based on testimony, they need to determine a cause and manner of death;
- Determine if another individual(s) is criminally responsible for the death and then identify that individual(s);
- 3. Review and examine all presented evidence and testimony;
- 4. This inquest proceeding shall be recorded and all costs shall be paid by the County.

We can review 16 P.S.C.A. § 1228-B: Inquest and Jury, at a later time.

In closing, conducting forensic autopsies are just as important as examining the body at the death scene. You only get one chance to do it right for the family, community, but more importantly for the decedent.

I said it earlier in this review and I'll say it again; "Never lessen the integrity of an investigation over a dollar!"
